Government Relations & Information

The Government Relations department:

- analyzes impact of government policies on people with disabilities; consults with community, caregivers and other stakeholders; recommends improvements
- Contributes to policy discussions and disseminates information via our website, *The Advocate* newsletter, policy briefs, presentations to committees, and new releases

York-Durham Aphasia Centre

- Locations in Richmond Hill, Stouffville, Markham, Newmarket, Maple, Whitby, and Peterborough
- Offers services and programs for people affected by aphasia, apraxia, dysarthria and other social communication disabilities due to stroke, traumatic brain injury or neurological diseases
- Volunteers, staff, speech-language and social work professionals work with consumers to improve communication, life participation and independence
- Aphasia camps and social / recreational programs

Conductive Education® Program

- Conductive Education[®] or CE is an innovative learning system based on the principles of neuroplasticity, that merges elements of education with physical rehabilitation
- Services children and adults with neurologicallybased movement difficulties, such as CP, stroke, and Parkinson's, to increase physical mobility, balance, coordination and self-esteem to achieve greater independence
- Offers pre-school, week day and weekend programs, and summer camps

Employment Services

- Job preparation and placement for people with disabilities, including assessment and coaching
- Offers recruiting solutions for employers
- Available in Ontario to clients of Veterans Affairs Canada, Ontario Disability Support Program, Workplace Safety & Insurance Board, Ontario Works, Service Canada, or other referral sources
- CanVet services in Ontario, Quebec and Maritimes

Independent Living Services

- Available across Ontario, under contract with Local Health Integration Networks
- Attendant Care Services via outreach or supportive housing
 - Non-medical assistance with activities of daily living in the home, work place or school
- Acquired Brain Injury Services
 - Focused rehabilitation services to maximize functional abilities in the home and community
- BeFriending[®] Program
 - Volunteers are matched with individuals and/or groups to help adults with disabilities with social activities and integration

Northern Medical Clinics

- Medical specialists volunteer their time and fees to serve northern Ontario communities such as Cochrane, Hearst and Kirkland Lake
- Saves northern Ontarians the time and expense of traveling to see medical specialists and receive treatment
- Supported by our staff, volunteers, host hospitals and various local organizations, the clinics have also received funding from the Porcupine United Way and the Ministry of Health and Long-Term Care

Peer Support Programs

- Post-Polio Canada and Stroke Recovery Canada[®]
- Serves approximately 5,000 each year
- Utilizes a Community based Peer Support model where survivors assist survivors and their caregivers
- Provides information and support on health, risk awareness, and caregiving through conferences, seminars, our website, forums, and newsletters
- Toll free Warmline[®] for survivors and their caregivers
- Provides social and integration events

Recreation & Integration Services

- Provides recreational activities with attendant care support and accessibility features
- Accessible holidays, day trips and tours, social clubs, camping, adapted sports and leisure activities
- Life skills and transition services for youth
- Group and individual travel

- Barrier-Free Design Services
- DesignAbility[®]
- Assistive Devices Program (ADP)
- Home & Vehicle Modification[®] Program (HVMP)



Barrier-Free Design Services

- Provides design expertise in accommodating the needs of people with a wide range of disabilities during the development or redesign of residential or commercial buildings
- Drawing review, assessments of new/renovation projects, on-site consultations and budget estimates, construction recommendations
- Assessments of the work environment, including ergonomic assessments with an occupational therapist

DesignAbility[®] Program

- DesignAbility[®] uses the ingenuity of skilled volunteers such as metal and wood workers, engineers, occupational therapists – to develop and build solutions to everyday challenges presented to individuals
- Program matches volunteers to consumers in need to provide individualized solutions or device modifications
- Chapters across Ontario and expanding across Canada
- Volunteers create more than 100 individualized solutions every year!

DesignAbility[®] Project Example

Arm Stabilizer

Problem

 Consumer in wheelchair had difficulty stabilizing arm

Solution

 DesignAbility[®] volunteer created a fixed post to attach to work surface

Method

 A padded support post was designed and attached to work table creating fixed point to rest arm against

Benefit

Consumer increased coordination of arm and hand



DesignAbility[®] Project Example

Wheelchair "Shopping Box & Tray"

Problem

Consumer in motorized wheelchair was
unable to go shopping without assistance

Solution

 DesignAbility[®] volunteer developed a covered shopping basket that can be mounted on the front of the wheelchair

Method

• A metal box was designed and mounted to the wheelchair using copper tubing. Plastic edging was used to create a tray as well

Benefit

• Consumer is able to now shop and use box as a tray



Assistive Devices Program (ADP)

- Available in Ontario for adults only
- Qualified applicants may receive funding for purchase and/or repairs of equipment
- Provides basic funding for equipment



- Staff search for alternate cost sharing resources such as government departments, agencies, service clubs, churches, and family may contribute.
- Last year, ADP provided over 1100 consumers with 2400 devices. \$2 million worth of equipment such as wheelchairs, walkers, and bath aids were provided.

ADP Eligibility Criteria

The Applicant must..

- Be a permanent Ontario resident
- Be a person with a substantial impairment caused by bodily injury, birth defect or illness that is expected to last one year or more
- Have an impairment that impedes mobility, resulting in substantial restriction in activities of daily living
- Require financial support in accordance with program guidelines

Home & Vehicle Modification[®] Program

- Available in Ontario for children and adult needs
- Funded by Ministry of Community & Social Services
- Program offers structural modifications to home owners. Renters can apply for transferable installed equipment (e.g. Ceiling tracks, stair glides etc.)
- Up to \$15,000 per lifetime for a home modification
- Up to \$15,000 per 10 years for a vehicle modification
- Total funds available: \$9.2 Million annually
- Over 1,100 people served each year

HVMP Eligibility Criteria

The Applicant must..

- Be a permanent Ontario resident
- Be a person with a substantial impairment caused by bodily injury, birth defect or illness that is expected to last one year or more
- Have an impairment that impedes mobility and results in substantial restriction in activities of daily living (e.g. personal care, functioning in the community)

ADP and HVMP Applications

- Applications available online: download/print the application or apply online!
- Determine eligibility first with an online assessment
- One Stop: ability to apply simultaneously to both ADP and HVMP programs
- One Stop: for ADP applications, choice to apply to March of Dimes (>19 yrs) or Easter Seals (<19 yrs) when completing online application

HVMP Success Stories
